POSSIBLE "WINDJAMMER" TRANSMISSIONS.

Reports from 60 Group show that the Radar Station at Fairlight has obtained responses from a reflecting object situated in the neighbourhood of Desvres. This appears to be an aerial system rotating steadily at a rate of one revolution per minute.

In general, such responses, when obtained at Radar Stations, originate on radar aerial systems of the Freya type; no Freya station, however, is known in the Desvres area, and no signal has been reported showing a one-revolution-per-minute rate. It is therefore thought very probable that the reflection comes from the Windjammer Aerial Array near Desvres. Reflections have been observed on a number of occasions in the past few weeks, both by day and by night, and have persisted for periods of some hours. If the assumption that the source of these reflections is the Windjammer Aerial Array is correct, it would appear that the aerial is now fairly frequently rotating and possibly radiating signals.

Measurements based on photographs of the Windjammer Aerial Array suggest a frequency in the 30 Mc/s. region for these signals.

It is requested that a watch be kept for possible transmissions showing a periodicity of one minute and emanating from the Desvres area.
